

Dear Parents

Being new to Homefield this term it has been a pleasure getting to know the boys and the wider Homefield community. Something that is already standing out to me is how inquisitive the Homefield boys are and how much they enjoy their learning and being successful in their endeavours.

At Homefield we recognise the importance of celebrating the boys' successes and enjoy doing so in many ways, particularly in our Friday celebration assemblies which are a highlight of the week. Whilst the boys enjoy receiving house points, awards or certificates for their successes, we believe that it is important for them to understand that it is their effort as well as their achievement that is being acknowledged and rewarded. This is a key distinction to make. They won't succeed all the time, but if they try their very best, learn from their mistakes and recognise this, they will feel a real and lasting sense of accomplishment which will really boost their self-esteem.

Research shows that children's selfesteem is boosted when others recognise their strengths and achievements however small or large they may be. This can be achieved by simple acknowledgement of the everyday things they succeed at and do so well, accomplishments others might brush off as too easy, or acts adults might not even notice. By recognising and celebrating such small, everyday successes parents and teachers can reinforce resilience and self-esteem in children in immeasurable ways. However, it is also important for the boys to develop the ability to recognise, acknowledge and self-reward their own effort and achievements, no matter how small. This really is a key life skill that they can take into adolescence and adulthood.

On the subject of celebrating achievements, please do look out for the 2017/2018 Yearbook which the boys will be bringing home in their bags today. It really is lovely to look back over the past academic year, seeing the boys engaged in first class learning in so many exciting and creative ways. I am sure the boys have created many happy memories along the way too #CreatingMemoriesSince1870

Year 4 Football Fixture




Here's our 'A' Team after they came back from 1-3 down to draw 3-3


