

Dear Parents

Each new school year brings its own challenges and opportunities and despite the long days it has been an absolute pleasure to witness the pupil's zest for learning, manners and fervour towards all things that a busy day at Homefield can throw at them.

Success and our first half-term have gone hand in hand. We, as staff, have been continuously impressed by the numbers of House Points earned, to the improved performances on the sports fields culminating in victories for many of the year groups, to impeccably dealing with the external pressures imposed by the most-examined system in Europe: the 11+. This is just the tip of the success iceberg, there are many, many more.

What has paved the way for this success at school? There are two immediate things that come to mind: the pupils and the staff.

Firstly, the pupils. I have been impressed by their unwavering efforts and the positivity they employ when pursuing new challenges. This was typified by a Year 6 pupil in a lesson who got a question wrong during a class discussion, he then shrugged his shoulders and said "Ah of course! Okay, I will get the next one right". The 'Homefield shrug', this was not the only class that I witnessed this in.

To the staff, I am grateful for all their efforts. It is easy to let our naturally aspirated pupils 'coast', but the learning opportunities and creativity of their lessons whether that be through their curriculum design, questioning, challenge, transparency and rapport, have truly helped matters and been a joy to observe.

After nearly six busy weeks there must be a sombre realisation in your minds as parents: 'Over to us now for two weeks'. I suspect this will be reciprocated on the morning of the 30th October.

To genuinely help, and not tease (unlike the previous sentence!) I have challenged the boys to help around the house over the half-term. To assist with the shopping, the tidying up and most importantly, to learn the art of making a perfect cup of tea or coffee and serve it to their parents. The boys gave me their assurances this morning in our Whole School assembly - good luck!

Most importantly, I hope our pupils explore their hobbies and enjoy the half-term.

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Lower School: Reception, Years 1 and 2

Last week in Reception, we had a brilliant trip to Gatton Park to hunt for the Gruffalo! We had to follow the footprints of the animals through the 'deep, dark woods' to find the different characters. We foraged for some ingredients for a delicious Gruffalo crumble and also made some Gruffalo faces with clay on the trees.



All the staff at Gatton Park were so impressed with the boys' behaviour and their enthusiasm. We also had so much fun that some boys enjoyed a refreshing nap on the way back! In Literacy, our text has been 'Percy the Park Keeper' and our focus has been learning what a character and setting are. Ethan in RS said, "A setting is where everything happens." In maths we have been learning about numbers 4 and 5 whilst also exploring squares and rectangles. Azai in RS said, "Rectangles are long, squares are short." We have also started some simple addition with number bonds to 5, using the numicon to support us and learning how to represent our number bonds in different ways. We created some mathematical art inspired by Modrain using squares and rectangles and talked about the features of these shapes. Our topic has been learning about Harvest Festival and we created our very own scarecrow to protect the fruits and vegetables that are growing in our Homefield garden. We used our knowledge of scarecrows to construct 'Hayden' (the scarecrow) but also our critical thinking to decide on how to piece Hayden together and to get him to stand up. We also worked on developing our teamwork skills as we collaboratively to build up his body and legs with hay.



In English, Year 1 have been learning about different word types, starting with verbs. We have been learning not only how to find verbs in a sentence, but also how to use a range of verbs to make our sentences more exciting!

In maths, Year 1 have been learning how to recognise numbers to 100 and learning how to write numbers in word form. We have continued to develop our understanding of place value by placing 2-digit numbers in place value columns to demonstrate our understanding of tens and ones.

In history, we have continued our topic of transport with learning about the history of trains. Dylan in 1S said, "Old trains are not electric they use steam. I've been on a steam train before in Sri Lanka!" Gryffin shared, "Old trains are steam powered, like the Rocket! Trains today are electric and there is an extra rail which carries the electricity. Steam trains still exist today." In PSHE we have been learning what 'privacy' means and how to keep ourselves safe.

In Year 2, we have continued with our focus text of 'Masha and the Firebird'. We have used the text as a stimulus to write formal and informal letters. We are now excellent at writing complaint letters as we wrote one to Baba Yaga! In maths, we have been learning a range of strategies to add numbers over a tens boundary such as bridging, repartitioning and using number lines. This has helped us with our mental maths as we are able to add numbers faster in our heads.



In history, we have continued with our topic of the Great Fire of London by ordering the events that took place over the five days that the fire burnt. Noah from 2H explained, "The fire started early Sunday morning because the baker Thomas Farriner didn't put out his fire. The wind was so bad and that's why it spread over all the houses; they were also made of wood which made them burn."

We had to use persuasive language and give detailed reasons as to why this is important. In art, we have continued with our theme of nature and art by completing detailed nature sketches.

Science News

Year 4 were very excited to use the Bunsen burners for the first time and 4S have been awarded their Bunsen burner licenses. They put their new skill into action with a practical involving heating ice and recording its temperature as it transitioned from solid to liquid to gas.



Year 5 have been enjoying getting to grips with the microscopes. They have used them to look at their own cheek cells and the cells in onion skin.



Year 6 are currently learning about different techniques for separating mixtures; they have used dissolving, filtering and evaporation to extract pure salt from rock salt.



They have also had a go at paper chromatography where they separated the mixtures of inks in different coloured felt tip pens, and the dyes in the coating of Skittles. The boys did very well to resist the temptation to also taste test the sweets!

Trips and Visits

Year 6 Visit to Verulamium 2023

Last Tuesday, boys in Year 6 undertook an excursion to St Albans in order to learn more about the Roman city of Verulamium, once the third largest Roman settlement in the province of Britannia.

Upon arrival, our boys were introduced to the site by a short audio-visual display, before splitting up to either explore the museum galleries or undertake a workshop handling and investigating Roman artefacts. Armed with their worksheets and clipboards, boys in the galleries enthusiastically sought out answers to their questions. However, what was most pleasing to see was the discussion and further questions which the boys themselves generated as they examined the vast collection of artefacts and considered the nature of life in a Roman town



Whilst some marvelled at the impressive mosaics, others drew comparisons between the coinage and merchandise of ancient and modern trade, and still others sat down to challenge each other in Roman board games.



Meanwhile, in the artefacts room boys were tasked with becoming archaeological detectives, 'seeing', 'thinking' and 'wondering' about the objects in front of them and what their function may have been. There were many different objects both real finds and replicas, including a box flue tile from a hypercaust, plumb bob from a Roman groma, a knife handle made of bone and various pottery items.



Some boys even had the opportunity to dress up as Ancient Romans and discover how their clothing and colours demonstrated status.

After lunch, we took a walk around the park near the museum to visit the remains of the 3rd century Roman walls and an exposed hypercaust system which was once part of a mansiones (guest-house). Walking around the site also endowed the boys with a conception of the original size of the settlement.



We also made a visit to the remains of the Roman theatre – the only such remains still present in Britannia. Students learnt about the unique functions of this theatre, built in AD140 and capable of seating 7000, which doubled for the local inhabitants at the times as a stand-in amphitheatre, plus religious site. Again, boys were aided in their understanding of a Roman theatrical production's nature by seeing the ruins at first hand.

Gifted and Talented Morph Trail Challenge Prize Winners

At the start of the summer break the boys were set the challenge to find the 6-foot tall Morph statues that were erected near to various London landmarks as part of a trail. There were 56 Morphs in total, each with a unique design and story. Lots of boys took part in the challenge, but the entries chosen as the prize winners, for especially good presentations, were from Charlie (2H), Kylesh (2H) and Elijah (5P). The boys used many skills including literacy, art and design and communication to carry out their 'Morph hunting' and put together their presentations. The presentations included picture collages, videos, journals and model Morphs. Well done to our prize winners.


