Year 6 Visit to London Zoo

The trip to London Zoo was AMAZING! All of Year 6 have been looking forward to this trip for many weeks. When we got there, it was all that I expected and more: open space and animals everywhere you looked. The first enclosure we saw included 'vulture like' birds called Northern Bald Ibises. They had black feathers, beautifully flowing up to their neck where the hair spikes out to reveal a hairless face with rather blank eyes.

We then went on to see numerous other animals including giraffes, lions, hunting dogs, monkeys, lemurs, parrots, and several others but the best of all were the Humboldt penguins. The penguins had the most wonderful enclosure. It was open air with a very large pool (1200m² to be precise) and they weren't scared of us, in fact they were extremely playful. Swimming around and every so often diving down and 'greeting' us through the lower windows. What also caught my attention in the penguin enclosure, was a size representation of the Palaeudyptes Klekowskii, also known as the Colossus penguin. The penguin was 2 and a half metres tall and lived in Antarctica but is now extinct. Interestingly, I had done research on Colossus penguins as part of one of my homework.

The second best was the Tiny Giants room. You could see all the tiny ants, millipedes, crickets, cockroaches, etc. scuttling around and it makes you think about their view of the world. The ants especially were impressive, especially the leafcutter ants which can lift up to 30 times their own body weight! They are extremely hardworking animals for their size.

Ms Smith, gave us additional information and facts about each animal, which made the experience even more interesting and valuable.

We all went home after going to the gift shop, exhausted after a long day of seeing wonderful animals at ZSL London Zoo. *Siddarth 6S*

Year 4 Cricket Fixtures

Year 4 took on Hawthorns School on the 26th May at Sutton Cricket Club. Homefield's 'C' team fell 13 runs short of Hawthorns score of 35 runs. Highlights were Rudy, Kamran and Aarav all getting wickets bowled, as well as two run outs by good Homefield fielding. When batting, Aarush, Zareef and Rudy (2) all hit fours. On the 'B' team pitch, Homefield scored 36 runs, with Gary hitting the team's only four. Despite some accurate bowling by Reilly, Adam and Shomik, Hawthorns finished on 68 to win by 32 runs. The Hawthorns 'A' team also scored 68 runs -Homefield took four wickets through Darwin and Josh (both bowled), Mikaeel (caught and bowled) and there was also a run out. However, Homefield had set them a target of 47 runs meaning the Hawthorns winning margin was 21 runs. Zohad hit two massive sixes and Mikaeel, Darwin and Ranvir all hit a four but ultimately too many wickets lost and not enough quick singles, proved the difference.

On 9th June, Homefield's Year 4 played their last fixture of the year, against Chinthurst School at Sutton CC. In the 'C' team match, the final result was Chinthurst 127, Homefield 71.

The highlights for Homefield were wickets for Jerry and Ezel, and a great catch by Eric. When batting, Ryan, Enming, Hei, Zareef and Alex W all hit a four. On the 'B' team pitch, it was Chinthurst 66, Homefield 29, as Baden and Thomas C-S hit fours. Kota took a wicket before Aled took two wickets in a brilliant over! For the 'A' team, Oba, Aaliyan, Oliver G (2), Zohad (2) and Mikaeel all hit fours, and there were sixes for Aaliyan and Darwin (2) as Homefield scored 79 runs. Homefield struggled to take wickets as Chinthurst raced to 107, however an incredible over from Hamza gave Homefield hope. He took four wickets (two bowled, two caught and bowled) and only conceded one run meaning his over was worth minus 19 for Chinthurst. Homefield needed just two more wickets to win but some good batting in the last over led Chinthurst to 102, securing them a 23-run victory.

Year 4's fixtures are now complete for the year. It has been a year full of success and challenge on the sports pitch. A huge well done to all boys who have represented the school so well in fixtures!

Science News

Fun and exciting events have been taking place in science lessons, recently.

Year 3 have been learning about soils and plants and have found out how to use universal indicator to test the pH level of soil samples.

They have also learnt about the parts of a flower through the dissection of a lily, which they enjoyed doing out in the sunshine! They are currently carrying out a paper helicopter investigation where they are modelling seed dispersal and finding out how the size of a helicopter seed affects the time it takes it to fall.

They have also been studying cloning and enjoyed using plasticine to model the process used to clone 'Dolly the Sheep' in 1996.
