

#### Science

A busy time in Science recently, 'Mother Nature Science' provided a workshop last week for all boys in Years 2-6, where they enjoyed investigating pneumatic systems, then applying their knowledge to make pneumatic models, ranging from birds flying through clouds to pneumatic driven football games.







Year 3 students from Robin Hood School have enjoyed visiting the labs this week to investigate the permeability of different soils. They have had the opportunity to use a range of equipment to carry out experiments to investigate scientific questions.

Boys in Year 3 are currently learning about rocks and have carried out an investigation where they used the properties of different types of rocks to identify 'mystery' rock samples. They also had the opportunity to make their own fossils using shells, plasticine, and plaster of Paris. Their artistic skills came to the fore and the boys took their fossils home, many keen to paint them.

Year 8 enjoyed seeing whose hair stood up the most with the static electricity produced by a balloon in a lesson on energy!


