The boys were persuasive in petitioning for an investment in sustainable hardwoods, as well as a space that provided for real physical challenge as well options for relaxation. So, we will have Douglas Fir bench seating along the side of the MUGA. Other equipment will be constructed from Robinia wood with a: 'Fallen Forest' for climbing, log hops for balance, a climbing wall/tree, a high tower and slide, a large basket swing and no less than three 'dens' to chill and play in. I sincerely thank the Parents' Association for the donation of £20K towards its construction.

# Lower School: Reception, Years 1 and 2

A busy start to the summer term. In Reception, we started our new topic of Pirates! The boys were thrilled with our new text, 'Pirates love Underpants', and enjoyed the humour, rhyme and repetition of the text. Our writing focus this week was to write a 'wanted' poster for the naughty pirates who stole the golden pants. We discussed the importance of adjectives and the difference they make to the reader. We were selective in the adjectives that we chose ensuring that they described the pirate in detail. Arjun said, "This pirate has a gold and red coat!" Idris said, "This pirate has pants as a hat!" Our Maths topic has been ordering objects according to size. Roger in RH said, "I know a word for something that is bigger than *big: gigantic!"* Freddie said, "If something is tiny it means it's even smaller!" Our topic time has covered a range of pirate activities such as role play, pirate play dough and we even painted our own pair of pirate pants!

A quick request for Reception parents: if you book your son onto Orchard Childcare during the day, please send your class teacher a quick email to let them know. This way we can prepare the boys and support them in learning their routine. We've also had a message from Mrs. Edwards that many library books from Reception have been returned in poor condition with many needing to be thrown away. We think this is due to water bottles leaking in book bags. Please ensure your son's water bottle is separate from their book bag.

In Year 1, we have begun our new English text, 'The Magic Paintbrush'. This week, we have focussed on predicting events in the text and retelling the story in sequence using story mapping. In Maths, we have returned to our topic of multiplication with a focus on understanding that multiplication is repeated addition. In Science, we have started our topic of plants and have begun by learning what plants need to grow and comparing seeds by looking at the differences and similarities between them.

Our History topic is learning about toys in the past. We have started by looking at toys that we use today and learning the topic-based vocabulary to describe them. Perhaps you could share your favourite toy as a child with your son, helping them to think about similarities and differences?



In Art, we have used the artist Marc Quinn as inspiration and sculpted our hands using bread dough! It was a messy but wonderful lesson!



In Year 2, we have eagerly started our new topics. Our English text is 'The Magic Finger' by Roald Dahl, which has certainly kept us entertained! Some of us even wished we had magic fingers to cast spells! Kaan in 2H said "*I would like a magic finger to get yummy food all the time!*" As we are reading the text, we are predicting events that could take place next using evidence to justify our predictions.

In History, we have started learning about London in 1666 and the Great Fire of London.

In Maths, we have started our new topic of fractions and looked at the difference between parts and wholes and how fractions can be seen and used in everyday life.

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
